Dear Editor;

Well, the picture is about to be shattered again. Another spring turkey hunt is on in some states and is about to start havoc in our woodlots just as all nature is being born anew.

In five different newspapers, I have read about this senseless hunt. The hunters are about being pushed into the woods as I read between the lines.

All the biologists report that although we had a very harsh winter the turkey population did not suffer much in loss. These must be a gobbler (a turkey with a beard) behind every tree. It isn't the winters that does the damage — it is the spring hunts!

The latest story that tells of the destruction in this hunt and, has made me speak even more against the spring hunts started right in your township of Andover. The biologists say — I quote one, — "It is hard to up-set a turkey nest or a hen on the nest while hunting as the hen hides her nest very well — even so the jealous gobbler can't find it. This I find is not always true. I have seen turkey nests (many of them abandoned due to the spring hunts) and they have not been concealed at all — maybe a small bush over them. Now the spring hunt story. Just out of Andover (in the township) a wild turkey hen built her nest just four feet from a house that was unoccupied as the hen started to lay her eggs. In all, the total was thirteen eggs. Another occupied house was just 200 feet from the nest site. The hen was seen most every day going to or from the nest. By this time incubation had started and unfortunately so had the spring hunt. The season had started and on the third day a hunter was seen near the unoccupied house — a shot rang out. The next day the owners of the house did some checking to see what the shot meant — it meant just what the spring hunts so often mean — the hen turkey lay dead right by the nest and shot just a few feet from an occupied house.

I have been out every morning this spring at 5:30 and I have not head one gobbler and it is pretty sad as I enjoyed hearing the gobbler echo through the woods. If it is recreation that hunters are looking for — the spring hunts are one WRECKreation that is harming our wild kingdom — I say we don't need a spring hunt. These hunts cause the death of many hunters due to hunters shooting at the "sound" of a turkey call and because the hunters play tricks on the turkeys by dressing in camouflage. (a war on wildlife) In Pennsylvania alone in just five years 136 hunters have been shot during the spring hunts. 85 of these hunters were taken for turkeys — 10 hunters were killed on the spot. The Pennsylvania Game Comm'n. has asked hunters not to shoot so as to up-set the nesting hens. How can this be done? Something just don't add up. When I told the story about the hen turkey being shot near Andover to a local resident — the reply was "That is just 14 turkeys that they can't hunt or kill in the fall". This war on wildlife must end soon.
