Mrs. Carney has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Marjorie Blair for 40 years. She was active about the home to the last day.

She is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Blair of Nunda, a son Nelson Carney of Perry, eight grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Nunda Funeral Home, Wednesday at 1 P. M., and burial in the Greenwood Cemetery.

Greenwood Central School Board of Education voted support at the Monday night meeting of the sex education program in the school but added an advance notice for parents before the subject is taught in any of the classes. There was some concern by parents of subject matter taught in sex education in health science and social studies classes. At the recent Parent Teacher Student Association meeting attended by 44 parents and teachers, the teaching materials were reviewed. The Board directed when possible, parents be given advance notice when sex education would be taught and if they don't want their children to participate other plans would be made for them during that class time.

The Board voted to continue its policy concerning students attending schools in other districts. The Supervising Principal when requested, make arrangements with

the Principal in the other school. At present there are nine students attending school in Whitesville, Canisteo, Jasper, and Andover and eight students from those districts attending Greenwood. For students attending Canisteo, transportation is furnished on the bus that takes students to BOCES in Hornell. There is no tuition charge for any students attending school in another district.

Supervising Principal Gary Moore reviewed the five year master plan for the district filed with the State Education Department. School enrollment is expected to remain stable at about 320 students. No major changes in instruction are anticipated because of the size of the classes and the building. The Board was informed that Title VI Comprehensive Employment Training Act application for funds has been accepted. The CETA appli-

cation was made to hire two or three persons to work on building and grounds maintenance and to receive training as school custodians. Their salaries would be federally funded under the CETA Program. The President's signature releasing CETA funds is needed before the project is operational.

The Board worked on the proposed budget for presentation at the Annual Meeting, June. Another work session on the budget will be scheduled. Two candidates Mrs. June Sekoll and Mrs. Donar Pritchard have filed petitions for election to the five year term of the Board of Education. The Annual Meeting and Election is June 7.

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"Inside The State Capital"

A public matter which has raised some heated argument at the State Capitol is the benefits being provided dangerous criminals. Corrections system authorities have implemented release programs which have resulted in some very serious consequences. Corrections Department records disclose that 473 inmates have escaped from prison release programs in 1976 alone, and 30 are still at large.

One of these walk-aways includes a convicted murderer who was attending the State University at New Paltz, free of tuition, guards or an escortances whatsoever. One day he just walked away and has been missing ever since.

I believe that when a person is sentenced to a prison, they have every right to further their education as long as they stay within the confines of the prison walls. There are quality correspondence courses at many prisons that programs where college professors come and teach courses within the prison. However, I seriously object to a system which places dangerous criminals in a seat next to innocent young people.

With 473 inmate walk-aways in one year alone and 240 of these people still missing, no one has to worry about what these criminals are doing now. Is a murderer likely to kill again, or a rapist to attack another innocent person? With the record the New York State Department of Corrections is amassing, this program is far too dangerous.

The debate over the prisoner education programs has become even more heated with the recent announcement that a convicted killer in Attica, has been awarded a \$1,600 Tuition Assistance Award.

The Attica inmate is Winston Mosley, the well known slayer of Kitty Genovese. A number of years ago in New York City people stood by while the man stabbed and innocent woman again and again.

I seriously object to a system where people convicted of such crimes as Winston Mosley are given state scholarships while hundreds of law abiding youths in hard-working, decent homes are deprived of a college education. Are we to expect people to commit murder so that they can get their college education?

I would certainly hope that Governor Carey would take the pulse of the people of New York State communities and ask - Are these the types of programs that you want? Should convicted felons be allowed to sit next to young people in a college classroom? Should tax dollars be spent on educating inmates serving life sentences?

It is very upsetting for me to see the state make tax monies available for every per program espousing the liberal sentiment, while I have hard-working people of the 136th Assembly District who struggle to pay their taxes on time when they can't afford to pay those taxes when their son or daughter can't even get into the local state university. I disapprove of this. I don't like to see their money squandered away on their lives threatened by such careless, dangerous programs.
