An information meeting on the school budget was held Monday night June 6 at 8 p.m. in the gym. The Board adopted a budget to meet the needs of the students and at the same time provide necessary support services to maintain the school system. The budget to be voted on Tuesday, June 7, from Noon to 8 P.M., is \$793,525 an increase of \$24,646.25 over the 1976-77 budget of \$770,878.75, an increase of 3.1%. Major areas of increase are in salaries for teachers and staff. Fringe benefits have increased some due to negotiated contracts, others to increased costs such as Workmen's Compensation, Social Security and Insurance. Fuel and Utilities are up, using more than budgeted this year. Central services included \$12,000 for maintenance and improvement projects. There is a large increase in equipment for the Agriculture and Shop area. A psychologist, through BOCES has been added and may be a week as there is more need for this position. It relates to the handicapped, special needs and general counseling for children. In athletics there is an increase in equipment and supplies, coaches' salaries and officials fee to upgrade the program for both boys and girls. As a line item, \$16,000 was included to purchase a new bus.

Ken Vars, Transportation Supervisor, has resigned as of July 1, 1977. Applications for the job are to be in the office by Friday, June 10. One cut will eliminate a bus driver and ask the mechanic to drive an A. M. and P. M. bus.

A member of the Board said, if there is no big change in equalization rates there should be little if any increase in tax rates in the District.
