

School Board Holds Regular Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Tuesday, June 13, 1978. The following Board Members were present: Conner Stephens, Mary K. Slade, Virginia Milligan, Paul McCormick and Richard Godown. Other present: Elmo Barden, Ethel Kelley and Ed Van Stine.

The meeting was called to order at 8:15 by the President of the Board, Conner Stephens.

The minutes of the May 15th meeting were read for approval by Virginia Milligan, Clerk of the Board of Education. Richard Godown made the motion that the minutes be accepted as read. Paul McCormick seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were read for comparison. Paul McCormick made the motion and Richard Godown seconded that these reports be accepted as read. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Virginia Milligan made the motion and Mary K. Slade seconded that the Cafeteria Report be made a part of these minutes. This report showed a net loss of \$742.77 for the month of May. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Paul McCormick made the motion that the General Fund Warrant for \$36,343.55 plus gas be accepted for payment. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Paul McCormick made the motion and Richard Godown seconded that the Cafeteria Warrant for \$2,219.96 be accepted for payment. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Payment is due for \$30,000 -- Principal on the New School Bond Issue. Interest is due on this for \$540.00. This is the final Principal and Interest payment on the school addition. Mary K. Slade made the motion and Richard Godown seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

A resolution was passed that we cooperate in the reduced and Free Lunch and milk program for the year 1978-79. Motion made by Virginia Milligan and seconded by Mary K. Slade. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Budget Status Report as of May 31, 1978 was given to the Board of Education. Motion was made by Paul McCormick and seconded by Richard Godown, to file this with the minutes. Passed by 5 votes.

Motion made by Richard Godown, seconded by Conner Stephens, that the bills for July and August be listed on Warrants and paid. Motion passed by 5 votes of yes.

Motion by Virginia Milligan and seconded by Conner Stephens that we pay Federal Career Education Warrant for \$174.05. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Resolution -- Board granted permission to local Jaycees to hold a two-ring circus on August 4, 1978 on the school grounds providing they show proof of insurance. Richard Godown made the motion. Mary K. Slade seconded. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Board accepted the resignation of Donald Thorp as bus driver-mechanic. Motion made by Mary K. Slade and seconded by Richard Godown. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Motion made by Mary K. Slade seconded by Richard Godown, that we hire John Green as Bus Driver-Mechanic at a salary of \$7,000 beginning July 1, 1978. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Meeting adjourned at 11:05 P. M.

Town Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The fifth monthly meeting was called to order at 1 PM at the Town Hall in Andover, New York. Those present: Howard Burdick Supervisor, Harry Kemp Councilman and Justice, Erwin Lewis Councilman, Merle Dibble Councilman, James Haugh Councilman, Max Baker Sup't of Highway, Edna Baker, Clerk to Highway Assistant and Gladys Fox Clerk.

A motion by Harry Kemp and seconded by Erwin Lewis to approve the April 13, 1978 minutes as read. Carried.

The Supervisor Howard Burdick reported that he went to a Public Safety Meeting in Belmont and that Allegany County is going to assume the responsibility of the Fire Tower on Joyce Hill as of January 1, 1979.

Max Baker, HWY Sup't submitted the specification for a 6' fence for around the Tool House to be put up for bid. A motion by Merle Dibble and seconded by James Haugh, to accept the bids on a new fence, around the Tool House.

The Town Board authorized the Clerk to enter the Legal Notice for requests For Bids in the Andover News.

The Town Board of the Town of Andover, Allegany County, New York, will accept sealed bids for the following project: FURNISH AND INSTALL 1,294' of 6' HIGH CHAIN LINK FENCING PER THE FOLLOWING SPECIFICATIONS:

- 2-1/2" O.D. Line Posts
 - 3" O.D. Corner and Pull Posts
 - 4" O.D. Gate Posts
 - 1-5/8" O.D. Top Rail
- All pipe to be structural steel galvanized excepting the 4" Gate Posts which shall be scheduled 40 Steel Pipe. All Posts to be set 3' in concrete excepting Gate Posts which shall be set 4' Deep. Installation shall include (2) 20' Double Swing Gates, Welded Joints, 2" Structural frame located as required. Fabric shall be 9 gauge green vinyl. Galvanized Prior to vinyl coating.

Any further information may be obtained from Max Baker, Superintendent of Highways.

Each bid shall be filed with the Town Clerk, West Center and Main Street, Andover, New York, by 1 PM, June 8, 1978, at which time they will be opened. The Town Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids. Carried.

The HWY Superintendent stated the Town is in need of a used trailer and roller for repairing the roads. This was discussed with the Board recommending the Sup't to inquire around as to the price of these items. The Sup't also stated that they were going to use a oil base MC 20% and 80% used oil on the roads this summer as an experiment in dust control. The cost of Calcium has increased in cost and is too expensive to apply to the road as a dust control.

Quigg Hollow, on the Donavan Plan, will be worked this year 1/2 mile.

Allen Mayor; Karl Graves, Ann Appier, Charles Dain and Howard McAndrew, Trustees; Barry Rohrabacher Superintendent; Robert Strimple Police Officer; Robert Hunt of Gowdy & Hunt; Karl Eastlack of Campus Life; Mr. and Mrs. John Cannon, Mr. and Mrs. Glen Lounsberry, Mr. and Mrs. James Cannon, Harry Weber and Dana Williams.

Minutes of the regular meeting held April 10th were read and approved on motion by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier. Carried.

Minutes of the Public Hearing on Water Rate Increase, held April 14th, were read and approved on motion by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier. Carried.

Minutes of the Public Hearing on the Budget, held April 14th, were read and approved as amended on motion by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier. Carried.

Water Street residents were in attendance to discuss the drainage problem on Water Street. They were advised that as of April 15th the Allegany County Health Dept. has more power than previously and should be able to take some action. Police Officer Strimple has been in touch with Pat Trapp of the Health Dept. about this problem and Mr. Trapp is expected to be in Andover sometime this week. The Mayor suggested that these people come to the Village Office on Friday of this week to discuss the problem with State Assemblyman James Emery, and try to get help from the State. A communication from the State Department of Transportation advises that the culvert on Water Street could be dropped by one foot in regard to this problem.

Karl Eastlack requested that Saturday, May 13, be declared Campus Life Day in recognition of the Workathon to be held by the Andover members of the group, as a fundraiser. Moved by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Karl Graves, to advise Mr. Eastlack that the Board did not feel it was in the best interest of the taxpayers to allow any solicitation. Carried.
