The Board of Education of Cuba Central School has announced the appointment of Gary J. Moore to the position of Supervising Principal, as a replacement for Mr. Joseph Savino. Mr. Moore is presently the Supervising Principal of the Greenwood Central School in Greenwood, N. Y. He is 40 years old and married to Janice and they have five children ranging in ages from 4 to 17.

He is a graduate of Mansfield State College (1961), holds a Master's Degree in Education from Cortland State (1971) and a Certificate of advanced study in School Administration from Cortland (1974). He attended Texas A&M University (1957-58), Syraing from Mansfield in 1961 he was SUNY at Binghamton.

Moore has been at Greenwood Central School since Feb. 1, 1974. Prior to Greenwood he had worked for eight years in the Broome-Tioga BOCES in Binghamton in several capacities from teacher of children with learning disabilities to Supervisor of Special Education. Prior to the BOCES experience he had taught in the City Schools in Binghamton in grades 4, 5, 6 and Special Education. After graduating from Mansfield in 1961 he was a teacher/principal of the Silver Lake School in Brackney, Penna. for one year.

Mrs. Donna Pritchard won the 5 year seat on the Board of Education by a single vote. There were 301 voters with Mrs. Pritchard getting 100 and her opponent Mrs. June Sekoll getting 105 votes. The write in vote gave candidate Bryan Higgins 84 votes and six ballots void or another name. The Central School Budget of \$735,525 was passed nearly two to one, 190 yes and 9 no and 9 void. The budget is up about 3% from last year's \$770,878. The vote was from Noon to 8 P. M. followed by the District's Annual Meeting with about 40 in attendance. Supervising Principal Gary Moore read the annual letter from the State Commissioner of Education. Virgil Hussey was chairman of the meeting and appointed as tellers to count the vote. Mrs. Leon Babcock, Mrs. Ronald Putnam, Mr. Timothy Brown and Mr. Bob Mann. The vote was so close they counted it three times to be sure.

Monday night about 25 voters turned out to have Principal Gary Moore explain the Budget. Twelve Senior Citizens took turns Tuesday helping Board Clerk, Mrs. Doris Bennett with the Election. Paper ballots were used Tuesday as there was trouble with the old machine last year and because of the write-

in votes. There are 750 possible voters in the District.
