Mrs. Regina Lynch Eno, 57, of Wellsville, formerly of Canton and Andover, wife of Professor Richard S. Eno, Sr, died Friday, July 15, 1977 at the Jones Memorial Hospital in Wellsville.

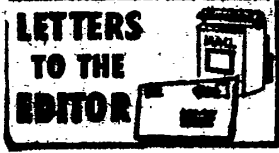

Editor's note: It is rather difficult for us to understand your question in the second paragraph of your letter where you ask: "Why, after the town officials have worked for months trying for this grant, should it be turned over for Village use only?"

In this land of Democracy isn't the majority — not the minority, supposed to rule? Isn't it a fact that two thirds of the entire population of the Town of Andover actually lives inside the Village of Andover?

According to the figures that we have, the population of the Village is 1,214, and the total population of the Town is 1,839, with 625 living outside the Village.

Village population 1,214  
Outside Village 625

Total Town population 1,839

Doesn't that make a two-thirds majority?

Don't the residents of the Village actually pay for two-thirds of the cost of the fire protection and ambulance service for the people living outside of the Village — in addition to paying for 1/2 share of the cost of these services for the residents inside the Village? And don't the residents in the Village pay the same tax rate for expenses of the Town with the exception of items 1, and 1a, which is for Town Highways?

And, while mentioning Fire Protection, where does the Fire Department usually fill up their pumper and tanker after a fire? Isn't it usually from the Fire Hydrant in front of Ken Vars home on Main Street? So doesn't this mean that the initial water supply at any local fire is coming from the Village Water Supply?

So, doesn't this show that two-thirds of the population of the Town would benefit directly from a Village Water Project, while the other one-third would benefit indirectly — at least as far as Fire Protection is concerned?
