Isn't it a fact that two thirds of the entire population of the Town of Andover According to the figures that we have, the population of the Village is 1,214, and the total population of the Town is 1,839, with 625 living outside the Village.

Total Town population 1,839 Doesn't that make a two-thirds mapority?

Doesn't the residents of the Village actually pay for two-thirds of the cost of the fire protection and ambluance service for the people living outside of the Village — in addition to paying for ½ share of the cost of these services for the residents inside the Village? And don't the residents in the Village pay the same tax rate for expenses of the Town with the exception of items 1, and 1a, which is for Town Highways?
