Allegheny County Fair

With the theme, "Happiness Is" Allegheny County's 1977 Fair will open at Angelica in less than two weeks. The August 1 - 6 event will continue recent trends of expanded programs and activities, as well as improved facilities. Parade activity, reinstated last year, will bring two separate parades to the program. An expanded Firemen's Parade will kick off the Fair, immediately following Opening Day ceremonies at 7:00 p. m., in front of the Grandstand on Monday evening, August 1.

A Float Parade has its own billing featuring the "Happiness Is" theme, at 7:30 p. m., on Tuesday evening, August 2.

By extending the Fair schedule to include Monday as regular program time, the Fair officials are featuring a full six-day event, instead of the five day of the past, and have made it possible to schedule the two-parade entertainment. A free gate will be featured all day Monday and Tuesday, and Monday afternoon from 1 to 5 p. m. will also bring special children's entertainment with Old-Fashioned Carnival Rides at 10 cents each.

A second Children's Day will be held Friday, August 5, with reduced prices on rides until 5 p. m. That day will also devote special attention to efforts to save Children's Hospital in Buffalo.

This year's program will include a Mini-Tractor Pull during Fair Week, instead of during the regular to be held July 24. The Mini-Tractor Pull featuring garden tractors will take place Thursday evening, August 4, at 7:00 p. m.

Facility improvements at the Fairgrounds this year include two new buildings. One is an extension of the recently added horse barn, which will add capacity for about twenty more horses.

A second major building improvement is the construction of a new metal shell building for the Industrial Exhibition. That facility is going up at the eastern end of the Main Hall.

The Education Building has been improved and will house a substantially expanded display of educational activities presented by most of the county's schools.

The Domestic Building has been expanded considerably by the conversion of remaining dormitory space there into display area. The growth in interest in domestic displays necessitated this change, which will essentially double the amount of display area for the Domestic Department.

The "bigger and better" thrust of the Fair in the last couple of years has prompted a good response from exhibitors and commercial displays and has made possible the expansions now underway. This Fair Board has plans for other improvements in the future, as the general trend of improvement occurs.
