The growth in interest in domestic displays necessitated this change which will essentially double the amount of display area for the Demestic Department.

The "bigger and better" thrust of the Fair in the last couple of years has prompted a good response from exhibitors and connecreial displayers and has made possible the expansions now underway. This Fair Board has plans for other improvements in the future, as the general trend of improvement occurs.
