We are happy to report that the project to attempt to solve the drainage problem between Rochambeau Avenue and Baker Street that has existed for over 3 years — was started out as scheduled on Monday, July 25th.

The agreement was signed with the County a couple of weeks ago, the personnel sent over by the County were interviewed, and four local residents were hired to work on the project. And, despite the early rain storm, the project began on time.

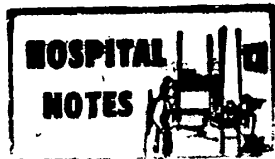
This is one of the two projects that was approved by the County to be funded under the C.E.T.A. program and will save Village Taxpayers in excess of \$4,000 on this one project alone.

The Village Electric Crew has also been very busy and now has the power line completed to the new Joyce Management housing development on the South side of Route 417-off the T. Joseph Lynch Road.

We are also one step nearer to hiring a full-time Police Officer as the recommendations have all been returned, have been very favorable, and our number one applicant has made arrangements for a physical exam that is required under County regulations.

As far as the Village application for the new 6 inch water line under E.D.A. funding is concerned, it has been a very lively and "hot" issue as has probably already been noted in local daily newspapers.

E.D.A. Officials have been in contact with us on three different occasions this past week and we have submitted the information that they requested each time. In fact our project has even been assigned a new Locator File Number — and the determination of our application now rests with top E.D.A. Officials who will be making their decision in the near future. Staff Officials have stated that the Village would receive the grant — One Official is quoted as saying "no" — but in a phone call from Philadelphia today, the decision now rests with the E.D.A. Legal Division, so — here's hoping!
