## "Inside The State Capital" By James L. Emery

Taking a Look at What's Been Done

The regular session of the 1977 State Legislature has finally crept to a conclusion, and I am touring the 136th Assembly District trying to meet with as many people as possible to inform them of what was accomplished this year

possible to inform them of what was accomplished this year.

The news media has extensively commented on the longevity of the session and many reports have labeled it a "do-nothing" session. In a closing statement read to the full Assembly body, Assembly Minority Leader Perry Duryea raised an interesting question of whether or not mere is a need to put a constitutional time limit on legislative sessions so that the public outsiness can be taken care-of in a more prompt and efficient manner at lower cost to state taxpayers.

A comparison of bills introduced and measures passed by the legislature and acted upon by the Governor shows. In 1930 a total of 4.127 bills were introduced during the three and one-half month legislative session of which 1.118 bills were passed by both houses and vetoed or signed by the Governor, during the six month 1976 legislative session, the number of bills introduced had risen to 20,152 with only 1,082 being passed and acted on by the Governor.

As these figures make cicar,

As these figures make clear, longer does not necessarily mean more or better. It seems that the law of diminishing returns has set in on the Legislature, with a waste of time at a huge cost to state tax-payers being the end result.

Turning to the subject of bills which were passed this year, the Governor has just signed two measures into law which deal with the problems of the battered spouse and keeping track of youths who get into serious problems early in life.

The problem of the battered spouse has in the past been an issue which has remained behind the closeddoors of family court. This has been changed, as an assult on one's spouse now liables the offender to criminal penalties. This is a good change in my opinion. The growing incidence of battered spouses demonstrates that the present system is not effectively dealing with the problem. Fam

ion. The growing incidence of battered spouses demonstrates that the present system is not effectively dealing with the problem. Fam ily courts only issue a slap on the wrist for this assault on another human being. With the imposition of penatlies including a possible jail term, people will think twice before they infict pain and injury upon their marriage partner.

The new law on the fingerprinting of juveniles committing serious crimes is another step in taying to deal with a difficult social problem. This new law provides for the fingerprinting of juveniles as young as age 11 who commit crimes such as assault, arson, sexual abuse or other crimes which would be class A, B or C felony crimes for an adult offender.
