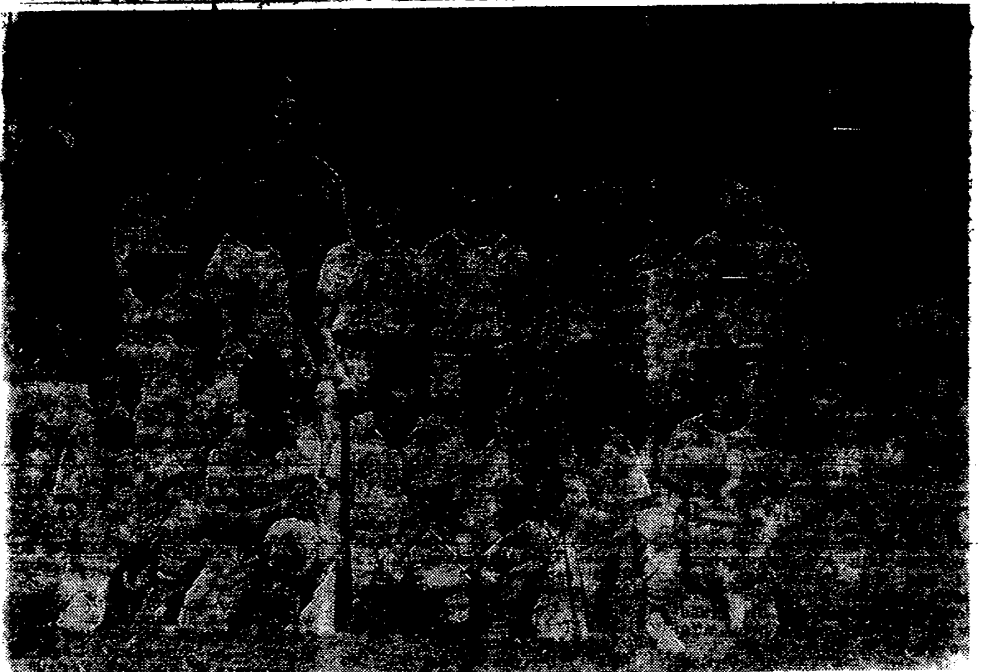
A Garden Tractor Pull has been scheduled for 2:30 p. m., on Saturday with several classes of tractors in competition.
