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# 1977-78 Small Game Seasons Announced

Peter A. A. Berie, Commissioner of environmental Conservation announces details of the small game season for 1977-78. The license year begins, as usual, on October 1 with licenses and small game funting guides available at all license issuing agents by September 1, the Commissioner noted.

\* Pheasant Season has beer extended in Columbia, Dutchess Greene, Orange, Putnam, Rockland Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester Counties.

Hunting Hours remain generally sumrise to sunset. These shooting huors also apply to Woodcock, even though it is a migratory bird. For other migratory birds such as ducks and geese, shooting hours are che-half hour before sunrisc to sunset.

Although the \$5 Federal duck stamp is not required when hunting woodcock, gallinules, rail or snipe, the shotgun must be plugged to hold not more than three shells. This is the same restriction that applies when hunting ducks and geese. Dates for the waterfow; season will be announced in late August.

# Andover Central School Announces Special Policy

Andover Central School today announces a free and reduced price

Andover Central School today announces a free and reduced price meal and/or special milk policy for Andover Central School child ren unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials have adopted the following family eligibility criteria to assist them in determing eligibility.

Families falling within these eligibility criteria, which provides for adjustment for uncontrollable financial hardships, are taged to apply for free or reduced price meals and/or free special milk for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent-home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. If a family member becomes unemployed or if the family size changes the family should contact the school to file a new application. The form it self is simpe to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any uncontroll able financial hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school meals and/or special milk. Provision is included for foster children. The information provided and metapplication will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility the decimated official will re-

the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the designated official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissat isfied with the ruling of the designated official, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Board of Education Presdent, whose address is Andover Central School, Elm Street, Andover, NY, has been designated as the Hearing Official. The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child shall be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school principal's office and in the office of the School Food Authority District Administrator where it may be reviewed by any interested persons.
