"Inside The State Capital" By James L. Emery

Hearing how other state legislatures across the nation address themselves to problems and implement their laws can pove to be a most beneficial experience. I had such an opportunity this past week when I attended the National Conference of State Legislators held in Detroit. Through formal meetings and many informal discussions with legislators from other states, some interesting and worthwhile ideas are advanced, and all states are able to benefit from the experiences and successs of the others. Let me give you a few ideas.

The subject of welfare is always.

The subject of welfare is always a big topic at any meeting of legislators, and the National Conference is certainly no exception. The problem of cutting back welfare fraud was of primary interest a few years ago and thus I mentioned by sponsorship of a New York Law to create an Office of Welfare Inspector General "to receive and investigate complaints concerning alleged abuses, suspected frauds and other violations of the welfare system". The idea quickly caught on in other states, and billions are being saved each year.

At this year's meeting, welfare

At this year's meeting, welfare is still of primary concern and the New York Republicans' concept of a welfare limitation act is receiving enthusiastic support. This act would set New York's welfare payments at a level nearly equal to that of other similar sized states. This would help to standardize welfare costs across the nation and bringus one step closer to the desirable federalization of welfare payments. However, noting Governor Carey's opposition to this idea, I wouldn't be a bit surprised to see it implemented and reducing welfare costs in some other state before it ever becomes law in New York.

Another issue which is being emphasized this year is energy There are the beginning sprout of a united effort on the part of the states to fight against the Carter Administration's proposed energy taxes and to encourage the development of alternative sources of energy and energy conservation measures. Legislators point out that energy taxes would be un

of energy and energy conservation measures. Legislators point out that energy taxes would be unjustly burdensome on those in tural communities who absolutely need a car as transportation, and that the search for alternative sources of energy seems to have been sidetracted by the federal government. As far as energy conservation measures, New York legislators are pointing out our new law which will ban the continuous burning pilot light on gas stoves. This step may not seem like much but it is estimated it will save billions of cubic feet of natural gas each year.

Finally-I would like to note that even New York State's-high level of taxation have been discussed at the National Conference by legislators fom other states. Those leaders from other states have learned not to follow New York's taxing lead and they are drooling over the fact that Ne wyork's high taxes are driving businesses to their states. I wish every other New York legislator and the Governor could personally hear what has been said. They would learn very quickly that New York is just too lavish with such programs as welfare. We in New York have got to turn off the money valve and cut back our exorbitant spending patterns. We must learn from the successes of other states and become frugal with the tax dollar so that more may share in prosperity.
