Inside The State Capital

Assemblyman James L. Emery (R-Genesee) revealed today that under the new marijuana decriminalization law penalties for the possession of hashish have unwittingly been rendered unworkable, leaving state and local law enforcement agencies perplexed over what they can now do.

Emery explained, "On the books the possession of hashish is labeled a felony. However, according to the New York State Police Narcotics Lab, the current definition of hashish - 'concentrated cannabis' - is nearly impossible to prove. Both marijuana and hashish are obtained from the cannabis plant and prosecution for hashish hinges on a lab test proving beyond doubt that a resin from the cannabis plant is used in the hashish, but there is no test known to the State Police lab which can show, without conjecture, that the resin in the 'concentrated cannabis' came from the cannabis plant rather than from some other plant. This will allow defense attorneys for those arrested for possession of hashish to move on behalf of their clients for a dismissal of felony charges in favor of the lighter, more lenient marijuana penalty of a \$100 fine.

"The lack of such a test was not a problem before the change in penalties under the Marijuana Decriminalization Act of 1977, and it was not the intent of that 1977 Act to alter in any way the strict provisions relating to hashish," Emery continued. "But in his haste to secure passage of the marijuana decriminalization bill, the Governor failed to consult with the State Police lab personnel and we are now left with the unworkable hashish provisions.

"I am now working with Assembly staff in conjunction with the advice-of-narcotics laboratory experts to legally define hashish separate from marijuana so that the felony provisions for possession will once again be workable. This legislation will be ready for immediate action by the Legislature as soon as it reconvenes in October of this year.

Emery concluded, "When the marijuana laws were enacted by the Legislature and the Governor this year, they made a commitment to the people of this state that the strict provisions relating to harder drugs would not be affected. Lawmakers must live up to that commitment and move as quickly as possible to close this loophole in the hashish laws."
