"I am now working with Assem bly staff in conjunction with the advice of narcotics laboratory experts to legally define hashish separate from marijuana so that the felony provisions for possession will once again be workable. This legislation will be ready for immediate action by the Legislature as soon as it reconvenes in October of this year.

Emery concluded, "When the marijuana laws were enacted by the Legislature and the Governor this year, they made a commitment to the people of this state that the
