Local News Report

The Iroquois Telephone Corporation sent out letters last week from a Greenwood-Jasper Customer Survey. There were meetings to have free toll service to Canisteo or to Canisteo and Hornell. This is their response offering two plans. This would affect Jasper with 335 phones and Greenwood-Rexville with 300 phones. Plan One, the Greenwood and Jasper area would be expanded to include Canisteo and Hornell adding 913 telephones without toll charge. Canisteo would have free calls to Jasper and Greenwood, but not from Hornell. The basic monthly service charge for residence service and business service would increase according to 1-Party, 2-Party, 4-5 Party or Multi-Party. If the basic toll free calls exceed 10,000, the next higher rate schedule would apply.

Plan Two to call Canisteo only, the toll free calling area would expand to add 1014 phones. The basic monthly local service charge would increase, but not as much for residence and business service according to number on the party.

As the basic monthly charge in Canisteo is also subject to increase, those customers are also being surveyed. Cards are requested to be returned in two weeks, both plans marked. The survey is in cooperation with the New York Telephone that services Canisteo and Hornell. All local service charges are based on current rate schedules for service within the Base Rate Area and do not include locality charges or taxes. The proposed plans will only be implemented if a substantial majority of the respondents in all three exchanges approve. The results will be made known as they are available.

The Democratic Caucus met at the Town Hall, Wednesday night, called by Democratic Town Committeeman Charles Wright. They nominated Bernice Oswin for Town Collector.

Steuven County Fire Coordinator Leo Jacobus of Bath, and Deputy Coordinator Eugene Jacobs of Hornell, met with the Greenwood Town Board at its August meeting to discuss participation in the County-wide Rural Numbering System. The Board voted to participate in the program and firemen will deliver the numbers and put them up if requested. The Numbering System provides for immediate identification for ambulance or fire service since each building and its number is recorded on master maps.

The Board tabled action on the request of the Greenwood Water Co. that it be taken over by the Town. The formal request was received at the July Meeting, although the topic has been under discussion for some time. The Board is seeking more action on creation of a water district and its operation before taking action.

Steps are continuing to have a resolution placed on the November Ballot asking for voter approval for games of chance in the Township. Requests for such action have been received from the Firemen and West Greenwood Grange.

Top Notch Dairy men held an Annual Cattle Judging Contest last week near Little Valley, sponsored by Alfred Agricultural and Technical College. Sheldon Atherton, Ag Teacher at Greenwood Central School, and his term Mike Hulse, Hugh Cornell, Mike Putnam, Ron Warriner, received Second Place Honors, judging six classes of Dairy Cattle. Hugh Cornell was also runner-up (second place) in individual scores with 170 points from New York State and Ohio, losing to Ohio.

The Greenwood Firemen have been given a present from the State Department of Environmental Conservation, a 1952 truck which they will use as a water wagon. The truck is a 6 by 6 Army surplus vehicle from Plattsburg, given by the U. S. Army to the DEC for fire fighting use. The truck is in excellent condition and the firemen have painted it the lime yellow color that they have adopted for their fire fighting fleet and lettered the truck with the Greenwood Fire Department logo. They have added a 1000 gallon tank and the truck and tank will add to the firemen's effectiveness.

Formal presentation of the truck was made Monday night by DEC Officers including Charles Crandall of Albany, Bill Bement of Arkport, Forest Ronger and Stonley Lowell of Bath, District Ranger, to Bryan Higgins, Fire Chief. The truck made an official appearance Saturday in the local Sesqui-Centennial Parade along with other fire apparatus from the Greenwood Company. This includes a 1917 fire truck, the firemen have reconditioned as a parade unit, and the \$38,069 high pressure fire truck purchased in May 1976.

The Greenwood Volunteer Firemen conduct several annual fund raising events each year, as the Summer Country & Western Jambores and the Fall Community Auction. They have made thousands of doughnuts and gallons of cider to add money to their equipment fund and have also filled the role of a service club to aid persons in the community. The most recent was the Spaghetti Dinner and Bake Sale in July to benefit the Roger Williamson Family. Rogers was injured in a logging accident May 2 and is on crutches now. The Town Board also include the firemen in their Annual Budget.

The DEC truck is the first equipment to be given by the State Agency to a Volunteer Fire Company and was given to Greenwood because of the large acreage of State Forest Land in town as well as the large number of gas wells in town. The Greenwood Fire Department will maintain the truck which remains the property of DEC. The Firemen's Ambulance Service is a big part of their work and greatly appreciated by the area.
