Dear Editor;

No wild promises but facts.

Three years ago the citizens of Allegany County elected me to the Office of District Attorney. I looked upon it as a show of faith in my capacity to steer the office away from the scandal and disrepute it was suffering, due to the misguided actions of my predecessor.

One look at the statistics of my office shows that in 1976 of 139 persons charged with felonies, 60 were convicted on one or more of the original charges; 16 were convicted on lesser charges (bargained down); 18 were convicted of youthful offenders and 44 are yet to be disposed of. These 44 outstanding cases have not been disposed of due to time limitations, motions pending and in several instances there are warrants outstanding in

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cases where the defendant has not been arrested.

I refer my readers to these statistics that show 60 plus 18 plus 16 equals 94 cases convicted. Add to that 44 which have not yet been disposed of and deduct this total from the 139 cases indicted, and you will see that only one case had been dismissed. A record difficult to better.

I do not make wild promises. If re-elected I pledge to improve the flow and process of criminal matters and to keep on working in closer contact with the courts and law enforcement agencies within the criminal justice of the State always trying to achieve the elusive perfection.

I pledge that my relationship with these agencies will be as it is now, one of mutual respect. A perfect balance needed to be able to perform our duties without friction or resentment.

The true power of the district attorney, is the discretionary power that the office invests in the person that holds the title. Power to open investigations, power to decide what cases go or do not go to court. I have been in the office of district attorney for seven years, first as assistant, and for the last three years as D. A. During my tenure I have used this power judiciously, but I have never abused it, as my record attests.

I pledge to use it in the future to protect the people to the best of my ability.
