Preparing For Dear Season

Year after year, about one hunt er in 12 gets a buck in New Yo.k In spite of this success ratio, there are a few hunters in every community who get their buck almost every year. Their success is not just fortunate luck-of-the-draw but to because they think "deer" all year long, and particularly from the time mat the first maple leaves in the swamps begin to turn. all year long, and particularly from the time trait the first maple leaves in the swamps begin to turned. In areas of heavy hunting pressure, luck does play an important part, but by spending many hours in the field, these nunters stack the deck in their favor. In addition to time-spent learning the habit of deer in their tavorite hunting area, they, do onto their thing that too many hunters overlook. They zero in her the so that they know exactly where it shoots. This is particularly true in shotgun country where many hunters don't ever appreciate how limited is the range of accuracy of the average shotgun.

The consistently success for hunter depends more on one killing shot than on spraying the direction of the deer with as muchead as he can. Knowing your gun and its capabilities is one of the basic elements of ethical deer hunting.

Our consistent hunter probable hunts the same area year after the land and the vegetative pattern. He know the good cover protecting deer from weather of observation, the arcas of good stands of food bearing plants and travel routes between resting areas

This is all background information helpful to him but each year he must build on it for it change from year to year. Spring weather will determine which feeding areas actually have he most food, and this will determine just where the deer will be centering their activity.

Most hunters can't sneak un on reading for reating deer, even if they know where the are. The reason for finding these areas is to know where they are spending most of their time, and then locating the travel routes they use between areas. Where the going is open and level, trails may not be well marked, but where the cover and the slope are more difficult deer cohcentrate in more well-defined travel paths. These can best be found around steep slopes, narrow ravines or dense low cover.
