George A. Rollins 82, was dead on arrival at the St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, Friday afternoon September 9, 1977, after being stricken at the barn at the farm of his son, Clair, on the Canisteo Road. He was active until the last, going to the farm daily to help with the work as usual.

He was born in Greenwood, the son of the late Lottie Campbell Rollins and William Rollins. He was a farmer all his life, retiring to the village about 30 years ago, but continued to farm with his son, Clair. He was president of the former Greenwood National Bank for 18 years and was instrumental in its sale to Rochester Security Trust as a branch bank. He had served as president of the Greenwood Central School for 18 years, beginning when it was centralized. He was over a 60-year member of the Dairymen's League, now Dairy-lea.

He is survived by his wife, Margaret Scott Rollins, to whom he was married for 60 years, having a family gathering in June for their 60th anniversary. Two daughters, Mrs. Duddy Box (Pauline) of Erwin, Mrs. Richard Willover (Rosamond) of Attica; two sons, Arling of Knoxville RD, Pa., and Clair of Canisteo, RD.; 14 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The family received friends at the family home Saturday and Sunday. The funeral was held there at 1 p. m. Monday with the Rev. A. Howard Gabriel, officiating. Burial was in the Greenwood Cemetery.

He was a farmer most of his life, retiring to Greenwood about 30 years ago. He rented out Orville Matthews Building Supply business after buying the store next door now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Morris Schenck, where he worked about 15 years, the last three for the new owner. He retired in 1970. Mr. Rogers was also a member of the new Greenwood Central School Board of Education for 12 years.

He is survived by his wife, Lana White Rogers; one son, Jerome, at home; a nephew and a niece in Westfield, Pa.

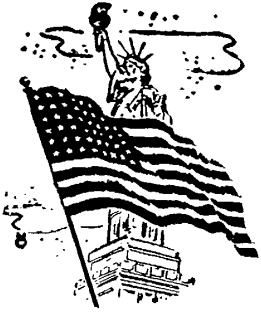
