WAYS WE ARE SAVED

We all need salvation, whether we be sinners or saints, or somewhere in between. St. Paul pointed this out when he declared: "If you think you stand, beware lest you fall." (I Cor. 10:12). Jesus said to the rich young ruler: "Why do you call me good? There is no one good, but God." (Luke 18:19). If I'm asked, "Are you saved?" I reply, "I'm in need of it at all times." There's no time when I don't need to be saved from something not good for me, and for something good for me. If I think otherwise, I'm in danger of the sin of pride which the Bible warns goes before a fall (Proverbs 16:18).

St. Paul points out that there are three or four abiding elements in human life that a person needs to be saved by: faith, hope, love and also grace (I Cor. 13:13; 2 Cor. 12:7-9). We need to be saved by hope. There's nothing in human life worth doing that can be done within our life-time. Peace all over the world will take more than a life-time. Happiness for the individual or for mankind will take longer than a life-time. Freedom for all, and a stable human society will take more than a life-time. So we are saved by hope — hope in God, and hope in Christ and His way of life.

We need to be saved by faith for nothing good or true or beautiful makes complete sense, or is altogether meaningful, in this life. This world we live in doesn't make complete sense, this life we live doesn't make complete sense, and people we deal with don't make enough sense. Even science and the church don't make sense enough. Therefore, we need to be saved by faith — faith in God, in Christ, and in people.

We need to be saved by love for nothing worth doing can be done by ourselves alone without the help of others. We are saved by a love which "suffers long and is kind — a forgiving love, for how else can we stand the frailties of others, and they ours? We are saved by God's love as we know it in Christ.

We need to be saved by grace as St. Paul points out in (2 Cor. 12:7-9,) for all of us have "thorns in the flesh" as he had, and like him we need more than prayer or faith to get rid of them or endure them. He prayed about it and got back the answer, "My grace is sufficient for you." And so we are saved by grace — by God's grace.
