THE BREAD OF LIFE

This year a great stress has been made about meeting world hunger by the Christian Church. If we are Christian enough, we of our affluent society feel obligated as good Samaritans to meet the needs of the world's hungry people, because half the world's people go to bed every night without having enough to eat.

But a balanced diet is needed for the whole person. Pork and poker beef and bridge, mutton and movies, beer and pretzels do not feed or nourish the inner man. You can get spiritual scurvy as well as physical scurvy by not getting enough spiritual vitamins. Religion arises out of a hunger for a larger life. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of truth from the mouth of God," said Jesus. He also said, "Blessed are those who are hungry and thirsty for righteousness." A loss of appetite is far worse for the spiritual life. It is those who are not spiritually hungry, who are satisfied with themselves as they are, who present a problem spiritually.

Only the hungry people can be filled. Sometimes the Gospel has been presented as medicine for sick souls, and this is true to some extent. But the Gospel has a positive side to it which Jesus stressed. He said, "I am the bread of life, he who comes to me shall never hunger or thirst." (John 6:35). The Gospel is food that nourishes the spiritually starved lives. Jesus meets the spiritual needs of people, the need for vision, for faith, for hope, for love and for the good life. When we Christians take Communion around the Lord's Table, they are conscious of their spiritual needs. The Lord's Table is for the spiritually hungry, not for those who are happy with themselves as they are. It is for those who are hungry and thirsty for a newer and better life which they find in Christ and His way of life.
