AN UPDATE ON THE BOND ISSUE

Listed on the November 8, ballot will be a proposal to allow the state government to arrange for \$150-million 11 borrowing to fund projects across New York State, Governor Carey has billed the progovernor carey has miled the pro-posal as an Economic Develop-ment Bond Issue. However, facts being brought out as we delve deeper into the real proposal lead us to seriously question the abil-ities of the bond issue to meet this goal.

When the Bond Issue proposal When the Bond Issue proposal was considered on the Assembly Republicians requested that a formal, legal list of projects be enacted as part of the proposal to be presented to the voters. This way the public would be fully aware of what they were voting on. Our idea of the list was defeated and we can now see the results of that action. Already there have been two different lists of possible projects which could be included for bond issue funding. The idea of the constant chang.

possible projects when estate deincluded for cond issue funding.

The idea of the constant changing of the list, seems to be to
offer a little sit for everybody in
order to entice voters to support
the concept, and then, after it is
approved by the voters to ramrod
still another list of politically advantagous projects throught the
Legislature which would actually
be carried out. I thank this is
total sham on the taxpayers of our
i36th Assembly District and other,
areas throughers the state. I
think it is also interesting to note
that the entire proposal may die
before it ever lets started because
of a legal challenge to the constitutionality of the bond issue
proposal. The court challenge is
based on the lack of specific intentions.

More information on the way projects would be funded is also beginning to surface. From the current list of projects we find there are almost no hard state dollars, only state borrowing, while local communities and the federal government are expected to come up with large shares of project funding. We've gone thru this earlier this year as people thought they were going to be inded under the federal economic development program by President Carrer and we found in practically every instance there was nothing received from the federal government. Now Governor Carey is leading us to believe that the gates are going to be open and federal dollars are going—to be flowing in. The Governor's original estimates were as high as \$2-billon federal dollars.

This has already been downgraded to \$1-billion. Judging from

This has already been downgraded to \$1-bi.lion. Judging from past history, even overly optimistic.

But I believe the real key to this bond issue proposal lies in the local share of project funding. Most governments in our area, although they need most of the projects, are not in any position to come up with the kind of iocal dollars envisioned. Leal taxpayers dollars envisioned. Leal taxpayers are alreadoy he wily burdened.
They cannt afford more tax pres-

They cannt allord more tax pressures.

The local shares of the state costs have been determined from the current list of projects. Allegany County would receive \$1.6 million in bond issue monies but would have to Lay back \$2.4-million. Livingsten County would receive \$1.8 million, but would pay back \$2.4-million. Ontario County would receive \$2.9-million but would pay back \$6.4-million. Those costs are large totals for what we might receive and they will be even higher when we add in any local government share of funding the prijects.

As I have said before, \$2.3 billion in unused bond funds already approved by the vocers still exist. I think that we ought to look at spending these dollars first before we inflate the scale's debts any further. Then if we find that we have additional projects that are needed, the scale can come to the voters and say, "okay, you have seen what could be done with this type of money," now we are asking you for more."
