## School Board Holds Regular Meeting

The regular meeting of the Andover Central School Board of Education was called to order at 7:55, Tuesday evening, November 8, 1977, with the following Board Members present: Conner Stephens, Richard Godown, Paul McCormick, Virginia Milligan and Mary K. Slade. Others present: Lyn Griffith, Frank Russell, Ethel Kelley and Dr. Charles Holowach, District Superintendent.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Richard Godown made the motion to accept these as read and Paul McCormick seconded. Passed by 4 votes of yes.

The minutes of the special meeting were read for approval. Paul McCormick made the motion to accept these as read and Virginia Milligan seconded. The motion passed by 4 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria Report was read showing a net profit of \$563.88 for the month of October. Paul McCormick made the motion that this report be filed with the minutes of this meeting and Mary K. Slade seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Board approved the establishing of three Savings accounts in order to obtain interest on funds not in use — on a day to day basis. General Fund, Trust and Agency Fund and School Lunch Fund. Motion was made by Mary K. Slade, seconded by Richard Godown. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Board approved the Quotation from Agway, Arkport, N. Y. for fuel oil for the winter of 1977-78. Quotations were sent to all oil companies in the area and the only response was received from Agway. Conner Stephens made the motion to accept the quotation and Paul McCormick, seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Federal Funds — Title I and Career Ed. — needs funds to meet expenses until funds are received. Virginia Milligan made the motion that we loan Federal Funds \$2,000.00 until funds are received. Mary K. Slade seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Board approved the paying of interest due on Bus No. 31 or November 30, 1977 — \$232.99. Conner Stephens made the motion. Paul McCormick seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Conner Stephens made the motion to accept the Budget Status Report for October 11, 1977. Mary K. Slade seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Possibility of getting a \$55,099.00 grant for improvements on building, such as insulating our gym and new wing and painting both inside and out. This is a labor type grant plus money for some materials. This work would be under Mr. Barden's supervision.

Mrs. Griffith, Mr. Jordan and Mr. Russell reported on their attendance at Administrative Evaluation Workshop - topic was Teacher Evaluation. They made a proposal as to how this could be applied here at ACS.

Mary K. Slade made the motion we accept with regret the resignation of Lyn Griffith effective as soon as possible, but no later than December 8, 1977. Paul McCormick seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Virginia Milligan made the motion that Debra Knapp be granted a leave of absence for the remainder of the 1977-78 school year to accept the position of Career Education Coordinator at the salary rate of \$10,825.00. Mary K. Slade seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Paul McCormick made the motion to grant Debra Knapp the right to intern in the area of guidance commencing January 3, 1978 until June 30, 1978. Richard Godown seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Conner Stephens made the motion we allow Martin Wesche to assist Richard Gill with the J.V. Basketball. Mary K. Slade seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

## "I Q" - The Great American Smokeout

What do the letters "IQ" mean to you? If you should see many local area citizens wearing large red buttons in the near future with the two letters "IQ" — it doesn't mean "Intelligence Quota" — (although the person wearing the button is really displaying a great deal of intelligence; it doesn't mean: "Im Queer" — (since nearly 30 million persons in the U. S. have joined the ranks) — what it DOES MEAN IS: "I Quit Smoking!"

The Great Smokeout is a nationwide effort of American Cancer Society volunteers to encourage smokers to pledge not to smoke for one day — on Thursday, November 17, 1977 — for a 24 hour period. The New York State Division ACS goal is to get pledges from 2 million smokers willing to try a day without cigarettes. Local Chairman of the Allegany County Unit SMOKEOUT, Bill Goetschius, says the goal in Allegany County is "to get every smoker to pledge."

"Even if a smoker goes back to his cigarette habit on the day after," Goetschius added, "he'll have the good feeling of control that may help him to cut back or to give up smoking all together."

Goetschius further explained that the concentrated effort to focus attention on this single aspect of cancer control offers an opportunity to affect the habits of the community. He said that all village mayors have been asked to give their public support by official proclamation of November 17th.

Volunteers are also distributing smoking education literature and motivational posters throughout the county to aid in the effort to help smokers and their families to help prevent smoking habit to detect possible signs of cancer and to help reduce future cancer in the families of Allegany Counties.

Additional information on SMOKEOUT, pledge cards, and supportive ACS literature & materials for the smoker who may want to start quitting one day at a time is available at the unit office at 46 Martin Street, Wellsville or from Mr. Goetschius. New motivational cassette kits for the smoker who sincerely wants to quit on his own are expected to arrive at the county unit office before November 17. Residents of the county are urged to see the "Lung Machine" when it is on display in their area (the machine is on loan from the Lakes Area ACS and will be in Allegany County for only three weeks).

Anyone willing to help with THE GREAT AMERICAN SMOKEOUT throughout the county is urged to call the unit office or Mr. Goetschius.

Locally, Meacham (R) received 367 votes for Sheriff and Bubenick (D) 117, with Meacham carrying the County by a large majority.

For County Legislators the local vote showed: Burton (R) — 304; Hifecock (R) — 274; Ryan (D) — 267; Watson (R) — 255. However on the County level, the race between Watson and Ryan hasn't been determined as we go to press as absentee ballots have to be tallied. However, an unofficial count reported that Watson was ahead by (four) votes.

Hopefully, we will be able to report complete voting results in next week's paper.
