REAL COST SAVINGS OR JUST MORE RED TAPE?

Two of the major reasons for the recent increases in the cost of automobile insurance have been the rising cost of auto repairs and the growing number of claims for stolen automobiles. In an effort to contain this area of auto insurance costs, known as physical damage insurance, a law was passed during the 1977 legislative session requiring insurance company inspection of all New York State registered vehicles with collision, comprehensive, fire and/or theft insurance.

Beginning January 1, 1978, all or newer automobiles which are being insured for these coverages must be inspected. All 1972, 1973 and 1974 models must be inspected before the 1977 renewal date. The inspections will include the completion of a form on the condition of the vehicle and at least one picture.

The State Insurance Department claims that the new practices of inspection and photographing will result in a savings of millions of dollars on auto insurance premiums. However, there are some sound reasons for skepticism.

First, the proposed savings was based on the original law which called for the completion of only a written form on the inspection of the vehicle. However, the State Insurance Department has added the requirement of at least one photograph, driving the cost of each inspection up to an estimated \$8 each. This means a cost of at least \$64-million for all this picture taking and record keeping in the state's 8-million vehicles. This \$64-million cost, which will certainly be passed on to rate payers, is well in excess of any expected savings from the program.

As if this was not enough, we must also consider the cost factors of maintaining the inspection stations, the confusion, delay and expense of frustration and mistakes created by the new program and the travel time and expense of vehicle owners to the inspection stations.

Clearly, the insurance inspection program is going to be a bigger headache and more expensive than the problem which it is supposed to relieve. And for all upstate New Yorkers this becomes particularly painful when we realize this new bureaucratic boondoggle is focusing upon a problem mainly prevalent in metropolitan New York City.
