Auto Repair Shop Fines Raised To \$1,000 Penalty

Albany — The Department of Motor Vehicles will begin assessing a civil penalty of \$1,000 from operators of unregistered repair shops on January 1, 1978. An amendment to the Repair Shop Registration Act of 1975 goes into effect on that date. Until then the initial penalty for failing to register a shop is a fine of up to \$50 or imprisonment for 15 days or both.

Commissioner James P. Melton announced today that the Department is currently notifying all unregistered repair shops known to be operating in New York State of the impending change in the law. Some 1,300 operators of unregistered shops have already been notified by mail. Melton said Altogether about 5,000 notices are expected to go out.

"Having enforcement in Department hands will make implementation of the law more effective, and the heavy fine will also serve as a deterrent," the Commissioner commented. "We look forward to the time when registering a repair shop will be as automatic as registering one's automobile."

Since November, 1975, the Department has identified 3,383 shops operating without registration, through the work of Department field representatives and investigators, with additional help from other State agencies, plus consumer complaints. The overwhelming majority of these have since registered or changed hands or gone out of business, while new shops have begun operating without registration.
