## Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office Monday evening November 14, 1977 at 7:30. Those present: Ralph A. Allen, Mayor; Karl Graves, Charles Dain, Howard McAndrew and Ann Appier Trustees.

Minutes of the regular meeting held October 10th were read and approved on a motion made by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier.

The following resolution was offered by Trustee Charles Dain and seconded by Trustee Ann Appier who moved its adoption:

WHEREAS: the next general Village election for officers will be held on March 21, 1978 and

WHEREAS: the Board of Trustees must designate by resolution, and publish the offices which are to be filled in such election and the terms thereof

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

Section 1. That the Board of Trustees designates the following offices as vacant at the end of the current official year to be filled at the Village election to be held on March 21, 1978 for the following terms: Trustee 2 years for expiring term of Karl Graves and Trustee for the two years to fill expiring term of Howard McAndrew.

Section 2. The Village Clerk is hereby directed to publish this resolution in full in the Andover News.

Section 3. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier for the Electric Supt. to accept the offer from Hyland Electric Co. of \$450.00 for the old unusable transformers from the old sub-station.

The following resolution was offered by Charles Dain and seconded by Karl Graves, who moved its adoption:

Town of Andover and the Andover Central School District for a summer youth project.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village of Andover make application to the New York State Division for Youth for approval of this recreation project and the Mayor be authorized to sign all necessary papers of application. This resolution was adopted by the following votes: Graves Aye — Dain, Aye — McAndrew Aye — Appier, Aye.

Moved by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Charles Dain, to submit an application for funds to be used for the senior citizens.

It was reported by the Clerk that the Equalization rate for the Village of Andover has dropped from 27.08 for 77 to 22.53 for 1978.

Moved by Charles Dain, seconded by Howard McAndrew, on the recommendation of Harold Joyce Building Inspector, to issue a building permit to "Vita Pro" bridge to build a home on her lot on Rt. 417.

Moved by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Ann Appier, that the Civil Service Classification of part-time mechanic for Martin Howland be terminated as of 11/14/77. Mr. Howland will be classified as laborer and will no longer work as a mechanic on Village vehicles.

Mayor Allen informed the Board that the bids for the water line from the Springs has been advertised and will be opened December 1, at 10 A. M.

Supt. Bohrabacher gave the report for the Street, Water and Electric Departments. This report is on file at the Village Office.

## School Board Holds Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Andover Central School Board of Education was called to order Tuesday, December 13, 1977, with the following Board Members present: Richard Godown, Paul McCormick, Virginia Milligan, Conner Stephens and Mary K. Slade. Others present were Ethel Kelley.

The meeting was called to order by Conner Stephens at 7:45 P. M. Richard Godown made the motion and Paul McCormick seconded that the minutes of the Special Meeting of November 29th and the Regular Meeting of November 8th, be accepted. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Resolution was passed to pay the General Fund Warrant in the amount of \$13,159.54. Seconded by Richard Godown — motion made by Conner Stephens. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Motion made by Mary K. Slade to pay Cafeteria Warrant in the amount of \$2,040.21. Motion seconded by Virginia Milligan. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Treasurer's and Clerk's Reports were read for approval and comparison. Virginia Milligan made the motion and Richard Godown seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Conner Stephens made the motion and Paul McCormick seconded that the Federal Warrant on Career Education for \$141.06 be paid. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Cafeteria Report was read showing a net profit of \$83.57 for the month of November. Conner Stephens made the motion to accept this report and file it with the Board minutes. Richard Godown seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Motion made by Mary K. Slade to pay interest only on the New School Bond issue. The amount is \$540.00. Motion seconded by Richard Godown. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Motion made by Conner Stephens to approve the Title IX Resolution for the 1977-78 school year. Paul McCormick seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

### Resolution

"The Board of Education of Andover Central School, Andover, New York, does not discriminate on the basis of sex in the educational programs or activities which it operates, and it is required by Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972 not to discriminate in such a manner. This policy of non-discrimination includes the following areas: recruitment and appointment of employees; employment pay and benefits; counseling services for students; access by students to educational programs, course offerings and student activities.

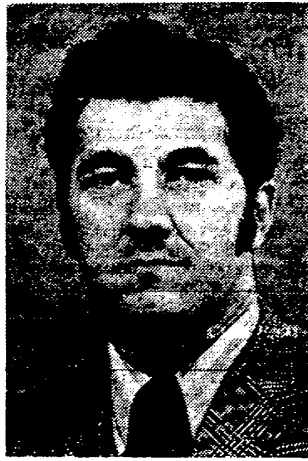

## Dr. William B. Bruce Receive Appointment

The appointment of Dr. William B. Bruce as chairman of the Department of Civil Engineering Technology at Alfred State Agricultural and Technical College was announced today by Dr. David H. Huntington, college president.

Dr. Bruce, who joined the faculty in 1974 as a professor in the department he will now head, succeeds Professor Alfred H. Nudd who has relinquished the chairmanship to return to full-time teaching.

Professor Nudd has been with the department almost since its inception in 1952.

He joined the faculty in 1954 coming here to take charge of what was then the Building Construction Technology Department. "We were part of the Industrial Division at that time and our department consisted of one offering — building construction," he recalls. "We had 40 students and two instructors back then but for three of the early years, I was the only instructor."

Today, the name has been changed to Department of Civil Engineering Technology to reflect the new curriculum which have emerged. There are now some 300 students enrolled in three programs: architectural technology, surveying technology and construction technology. The faculty numbers 12.

Among the responsibilities Dr. Bruce assumes as department chairman are supervision of teaching, preparation and management of the departmental budget, evaluation of faculty and staff, development of new courses, and review of all courses. In addition, he will continue to do some teaching.

Dr. Bruce is a former instructor at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and taught at Canton Agricultural and Technical College from 1966 to 1974 when he came to Alfred.

The new department chairman who will assume his duties in late January, earned three engineering degrees from RPI, including a doctorate which he received in 1972. He also holds a New York State Professional Engineering license.

Dr. Bruce, his wife, and their three children reside in Andover.
