Inside The State Capital

Assemblyman James L. Emery has joined the unanimous effort of Assembly Republicans to delay the implementation of a new auto insurance inspection program which is scheduled to go into effect on January 1, 1978, and he has criticized the Governor, the Assembly Speaker and the Insurance Commissioner for not taking action on behalf of insurance consumers.

Emery noted, "In a meeting held on Thursday, Dec. 8, the Assembly Republicans unanimously voted in support of a resolution notifying Acting Insurance Superintendent John F. Lennon of our desire for a 90-day moratorium on the Insurance Department's rules and regulations to implement the insurance inspection program. Additionally the Assembly Republicans are unanimously supporting legislation which would put the delay into law should the insurance commission er not act."

The efforts to delay the new inspection program comes in response to insurance consumers and businessmen who are alarmed over the inconvenience and estimated cost of the program which was originally supposed to reduce insurance rates by reducing the number of fraudulent claims.

Emery notes that the over-reaction and over-regulation by the State Insurance Department have created immense difficulties in implementing the inspection program.

"In drawing up the rules and regulations to administer the inspection program," Emery stated "the Insurance Department decided it was necessary to include a photograph of the car and a long complicated form as part of the inspection.

"This inclusion of the all too typical bureaucratic red tape would boost the cost of the inspection program up to a total far above any anticipated savings to be realized through a reduction in fraudulent claims, and one can be assured that the net increase in costs created by the program would be passed on to the consumer in still higher auto insurance rates.

"It is with these facts in mind," Emery continued, "that I have joined in support of the Republican resolution requesting the commissioner of the Insurance Department, either the present acting commissioner or the nominated commissioner once he takes office to rescind the regulations requiring the photographs and the excessively long and complex auto inspection forms.

"Should the Insurance Department commissioner fail to delay the implementation, I have joined in sponsoring legislation which would require, by law, a 90-day moratorium on implementing the inspection program."

Emery added, "During the 1977 Legislative Session, I opposed the legislative provisions calling for the inspection program. I now ask that the Governor, the full legislature and the Insurance Department act in the best interests of insurance consumers by halting the ill-conceived insurance inspection regulations.

But while the Assembly Republicans were in Albany pressing for the insurance inspection program delay, it was most discouraging to note that on a day when the assembly members were brought to the State Capitol for committee meetings the Assembly Speaker of the Democrat Majority would not even convene the Assembly's Insurance Committee. It was equally discouraging to note that at the same time, the Governor was touring the State to "assess his reelection chances" and the Insurance Commissioner was in Florida.

"On too many issues," the Governor and his administration have been putting off important decisions which affect the lives of every New York State resident. I hope the auto insurance inspection program will not be another "leftover" which we will have to pick up in the future," Emery concluded.
